# OTTOMAN EMPIRE FROM THE 19th CENTURY TO THE 20th: STRUGGLE Collector's Selection

The exhibit presents a picture of the struggle Ottoman Empire went through on both the administrative and the military front from Tanzimat to the War of Independence.

The exhibition tells the tale of "constitutional government, independence, liberty and motherland" struggle of Neo Ottomans who raised their voices against the ever-increasing interventions by European states in the process that began with 1838 Treaty of Balta Limanı, and 1839 Edict of Gülhane. It also makes frequent references to struggles on numerous fronts in the Russo-Turkish War of 1877-1878 and World War I.

### CIVILIAN ARCHITECTURAL MEMORY OF ANKARA: 1930-1980

The exhibition organized within the framework of the Project for Research, Documentation and Development of Conservation Measures for Civilian Architectural Culture Heritage in Ankara in the period 1930-1980, implemented by Başkent University with the support of TUBITAK aims to draw attention to hitherto ignored residential buildings erected in Ankara in the period, to raise awareness about such buildings and architects thereof, and to share their reproduction processes through their residents.

The project focused on Ulus neighborhood in its first year, followed by Kızılay and Kavaklıdere in the second and third years respectively. Out of approximately 300 buildings which were identified and documented during the project, 120 selected by the project team are described in the exhibition through posters, cards, detail posters, and post-cards, as well as oral history activities.
